ORDINANCE

For

Governing the Award of Degree of Master of Physical Education (M.P.Ed)

1. TITLE AND COMMENCEMENT

This ordinance shall be called the Ordinance for the Degree of Master of Physical Education (M.P.Ed), LNIPE, Gwalior and its off-campus centers and shall govern with effect from session 2025-26.

2. DEFINITION & KEY WORDS

- 2.1 “**Institute**” means Lakshmibai National Institute of Physical Education, Gwalior and its off campus centers.
- 2.2 “**Students**” means one who has been enrolled in the two years / four semesters programme of Master of Physical Education (M.P.Ed) in the Institute through Institute Entrance test or by any other procedure notified by the Institute from time to time.
- 2.3 “**Academic Year**” means two consecutive (one odd and one even) semesters.
- 2.4 “**Course**” means “papers” through different modes of delivery and is a component of a programme as detailed out in the respective programme structure.
- 2.5 “**Credit**” means a unit by which the course work is measured. It determines the number of hours of instructions required per week. One credit is equivalent to one hour of teaching (lecture or tutorial) per week or two hours of practical work/field work/project etc. per week. The number of credits for each course shall be defined in the respective examination scheme.
- 2.6 “**Credit Point**” means the product of grade points and number of credits for a course.
- 2.7 “**Letter Grade**” means an index of the performance of students in a course. Grades are denoted by letters as prescribed by the UGC/Institute from time to time.
- 2.8 “**Grade Point**” means a numerical weight allotted to each letter grade on a 10 point scale or as prescribed by the UGC/Institute from time to time.
- 2.9 “**Semester**” means an academic session spread over 17-20 weeks of teaching work with minimum 100 teaching days.
- 2.10 “**Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA)**” means a measure of performance of a student in a semester. It is the ratio of total credit points secured by a student in various courses registered in a semester and the total credits of all courses during the semester. It shall be expressed up to two decimal places.

- 2.11. **“Grade Card”** means a certificate based on the grades earned. Grade certificate shall be issued to all registered students after every semester. The grade certificate will contain the course details (code, title, number of credits, grade secured) along with SGPA of the semester and CGPA earned till that semester. The final semester grade certificate shall also reflect the cumulative total of marks obtained by the student in all semesters out of maximum marks allocated for which the grades of the programme were evaluated. However, the result will be based on the grades/CGPA.
- 2.12. **“Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA)”** means a measure of overall cumulative performance of a student in all semesters. The CGPA is the ratio of total credit points secured by a student in various courses in all semesters and the sum of the total credits of all courses in all semesters. It is expressed up to two decimal places.
- 2.13. **“Transcript”** means a certificate issued to all enrolled students in a programme after successful completion of the programme. It contains the SGPA of all semesters and the CGPA.
- 2.14. **“CBCS System”** means instructional package developed to suit the needs of students. To keep pace with the developments in higher education and the quality assurance expected of it in the light of liberalization and globalization in higher education.

3. DURATION

The M.P.Ed programme is of duration of two academic years, that is, four semesters. However, the students shall be permitted to complete the programme requirements within a maximum of three years from the date of admission to the programme.

4. NUMBER OF SEATS

The number of seats in the course shall be as per the norms of NCTE/Institute. The reservation of seats will be strictly as per GOI/UGC norms.

5. ADMISSION PROCEDURE AND ELIGIBILITY

- 5.1 Eligibility for admission in Master of Physical Education (M.P.Ed) shall be: Bachelor of Physical Education (B.P.Ed) or equivalent with at least 50% marks or Bachelor of Science (B.Sc.) in Health and Physical Education with at least 50% marks.
- 5.2. Admission to the Master of Physical Education (M.P.Ed.) programme shall be made through the Entrance Test conducted by the Institute as notified by the Institute from time to time.
- 5.3 Reservation and relaxation in minimum eligibility for admission for SC/ST/OBC/EWS/PWD and Kashmiri migrant candidates, as specified by Government of India.

- 5.4 Foreign nationals either residing in India or abroad or Indian nationals residing abroad may be admitted to the programme according to the policy guidelines laid down by the Government of India / Institute from time to time as per the number of seats available for this category. These seats will be supernumerary and shall be advertised separately in addition to the seats approved for M.P.Ed. programme.
- 5.5 Direct Admission will be provided to International Players as per Institute Policy.
- 5.6 In-service candidates can also apply subject to the submission of NOC from the Employer at the time of admission/registration.

6. WORKING DAYS

- 6.1 There shall be at least 200 working days in each academic year/one hundred working days in each semester exclusive of period of admission and examination.
- 6.2. Minimum working hours per week shall be thirty-six hours.

7. TYPES OF COURSES

- 7.1 The course structure shall be approved/modified by Institute/Department board of studies/Academic Council from time to time as per the direction of the Institute/ NCTE.
- 7.2 Core Course: A course, which is to be studied compulsorily by a candidate as a core requirement is termed as a Core Course.
- 7.3 Elective Course: Generally, a course which can be chosen from a pool of courses and which may be very specific or specialized or advanced or supportive to the discipline/subject of study or which provides an extended scope or which enables an exposure to some other discipline/subject/domain or nurtures the candidate's proficiency/skill is called an Elective Course.

8. MEDIUM OF INSTRUCTION

The medium of instruction for examination shall be in Hindi or English.

9. ATTENDANCE AND ELIGIBILITY TO APPEAR IN THE EXAMINATION

A student must have a minimum attendance of 75% of the total number of classes held during the semester including lectures, practical/teaching practice/tutorials etc., for appearing in the end semester examination. The Vice Chancellor may condone 5% of student attendance.

However, students shall be sanctioned 15% on duty leave in addition for the one or more following reasons: -

- (a) Participation in NCC/NSS Camps, duly supported by a certificate from the Commanding Officer.
- (b) Participation in University Team(s)/Games in AIU tournaments or State, National and International tournaments duly supported by a certificate from appropriate authority of the Institute/Association/Federation.
- (c) Participation in any of co-curricular activities organized by the Institute/Department, duly certified by competent authority.
- (d) If a student represents the Institute in any other Sports/Academic Excellence activities.

The application must be supported by such documents as considered to be fit for granting such on duty leave.

10. EXAMINATION AND EVALUATION

10.1 Evaluation

The performance of a student in each course is evaluated in terms of percentage of marks with a provision for conversion to grade point. Evaluation for each course shall be done by a continuous internal assessment (CIA) by the concerned course teacher as well as by end semester examination and will be consolidated at the end of course. The components for continuous internal assessment are;

One Test	15 Marks
Assignments/Lab Practical	10 Marks
Attendance	05 Marks
Total	30 Marks

Attendance shall be taken as a component of continuous assessment, although the students should have minimum 75% attendance in each course. In addition to continuous evaluation component, the end semester examination, which will be written type examination of at least 3 hours duration, would also form an integral component of the evaluation. The ratio of marks to be allotted to continuous internal assessment and to end semester examination is 30:70. The evaluation of practical work, wherever applicable, will also be based on continuous internal assessment and on an end-semester practical examination. The minimum percentage of marks to pass the courses in each semester shall be required to obtain at least 50% of marks in theory and practical examination separately.

10.2 Grading

Once the marks of the CIA (Continues Internal Assessment) and SEA (Semester End Assessment) for each of the courses are available, both (CIA and SEA) will be added. The marks thus obtained for each of the courses will then be graded as per details provided 10.4 from the first semester onwards the average performance within any

semester from the first semester is indicated by Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) while continuous performance (including the performance of the previous semesters also) starting from the first semester is indicated by Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA). These two are calculated by the following formula:

Calculation of SGPA and CGPA

$$SGPA_k = \frac{\sum(C_i \times G_i)}{\sum C_i}$$

$$CGPA = \frac{\sum(C_i \times SGPA_k)}{\sum C_i}$$

Where $SGPA_k$ is semester grade point average of k^{th} semester, CGPA is the cumulative grade point average of all semesters, C_i is the number of credits of the i^{th} course and G_i is grade point scored by the student in the k^{th} course.

10.3 Classification of Final Results:

For the purpose of declaring a candidate to have qualified for the Degree of Master of Physical Education in the First class / Second Class / Pass Class or First Class with Distinction, the marks and the corresponding CGPA earned by the candidate in Core Courses will be the criterion. It is further provided that the candidate should have scored the First / Second Class separately in both the grand total and end Semester (External) examinations.

10.4 Letter Grades and Grade Points:

- (i) Two methods-relative grading or absolute grading– have been in vogue for awarding grades in a course. The relative grading is based on the distribution (usually normal distribution) of marks obtained by all the students in the course and the grades are awarded based on a cut-off mark or percentile. Under the absolute grading, the marks are converted to grades based on pre-determined class intervals. To implement the following grading system, the colleges and universities can use any one of the above methods.
- (ii) The grades for each course would be decided on the basis of the percentage marks obtained at the end-semester external and internal examinations as per following table:

10.5 Grade Point Calculation

Calculation of Semester Grade Point Average (SGPA) and Credit Grade Point (CGP) and declaration of class for M.P.Ed. Programme. The credit grade points are to be calculated on the following basis:

Example – I

Marks obtained by Student in course MPCC101 = 65/100

Percentage of marks = 65 %

Grade from the conversion table is = A

Grade Point = $6.0 + 5 (0.99/9.99)$

= $6.0 + 5 \times 0.1$

= $6.0 + 0.5$

= 6.5

The Course Credits = 03

Credits Grade Point (CGP) = $6.5 \times 03 = 19.5$

The semester grade point average (SGPA) will be calculated as a weighted average of all the grade point of the semester courses. That is Semester grade point average (SGPA) = (sum of grade points of all eight courses of the semester) / total credit of the semester as per example given below:

Note:

- (1) SGPA is calculated only if the candidate passes in all the courses i.e. get minimum C grade in all the courses.
- (2) CGPA is calculated only when the candidate passes in all the courses of all the previous and current semesters.
- (3) The cumulative grade point average will be calculated as the average of the SGPA of all the semesters continuously, as shown above.
- (4) For the award of the class, CGPA shall be calculated on the basis of:
 - (a) Marks of each Semester End Assessment And
 - (b) Marks of each Semester Continuous Internal Assessment for each course. The final class for M.P.Ed. Degree shall be awarded on the basis of last CGPA (grade) from one to four semester examinations.

11. PASSING AND PROMOTION CRITERIA:

- 11.1 Student who cleared all the courses as described in clause 10.1 shall be promoted to the next semester.
- 11.2 If any student fails in one or two courses shall also be promoted to the next semester but shall be given the chance of clearing the back log course only in the next ATKT examination to be held along with the main examination (Odd Semester in Odd Examination and Even Semester in Even Examination).
- 11.3 A student will get only two additional chances to clear the back log course through ATKT Examination.
- 11.4 If a student gets any back log in one or two course even after the Final Semester Examination, in such circumstances, supplementary examination shall be conducted within 45 days from the date of declaration of the result.
- 11.5 Internal marks of such ATKT and Ex-students will be carried forwarded for the corresponding course in which he/she is appearing.

12. RANK, MEDAL AND MERIT SCHOLARSHIP

Only such candidates who complete successfully all the courses in the programme in regular/special examination (first attempt) shall be considered for the declaration of ranks, medals and Institute's Merit Scholarship.

13. RE-REGISTRATION

A student with shortage of attendance in any semester shall not be allowed to appear in the semester examination and shall be permitted for re-registration of the same semester in the next academic session.

14. POWER TO REMOVE DIFFICULTIES

If any question arises related to the matters not covered in these provisions, the relevant provisions made in appropriate Act/Statute/Ordinance/Regulations/Rules/Notifications issued by the institute shall prevail.

15. REVISION OF SYLLABI

- 15.1 Syllabi of every course shall be revised from time to time as per the guidelines of the NCTE.
- 15.2 Revised syllabi of each semester should be implemented in a sequential way.
- 15.3 In course, where units/topics related to governmental provisions, regulations or laws, that change to accommodate the latest developments, changes or corrections are to be made consequentially as recommended by Board of Studies and Academic Council.
- 15.4 All the formalities for revisions in the syllabi should be completed before the end of the semester for implementation of the revised syllabi in the next academic year.
- 15.5 During every revision, up to twenty (20) percent of the syllabi of each course should be changed as to ensure the appearance of the students who have studied the old (unrevised) syllabi without any difficulties in the examinations of revised syllabi.
- 15.6 In case, the syllabus of any course is carried forward without any revision, it shall also be counted as revised in the revised syllabi.
